

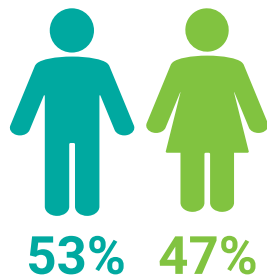
2023 Amputation Rehabilitation Program Outcomes

Who We Serve

17 people received **amputation rehabilitation** at Sutter Rehabilitation Institute in 2023.

The average age of the patients with amputations at Sutter Rehabilitation Institute was 61 years old, with the youngest being 42 and the oldest being 80 years old.¹

- **6% of patients** were under 44 years old.
- **41% of patients** were between the age of 45 and 64.
- **41% of patients** were between the age of 65 and 74.
- **12% of patients** were older than 75.
- **88%** White, not Hispanic.
- **12%** Black, not Hispanic.



Patient Satisfaction

Our patients express **great satisfaction** with the rehabilitation and care provided at Sutter Rehabilitation Institute. **92%** of patients who responded to the survey were **satisfied** with their rehabilitation program.



Follow Up

Patients discharged from Sutter Rehabilitation Institute receive a follow-up call to check on their well-being and reintegration into the community. Of the people who responded to the survey last year.³



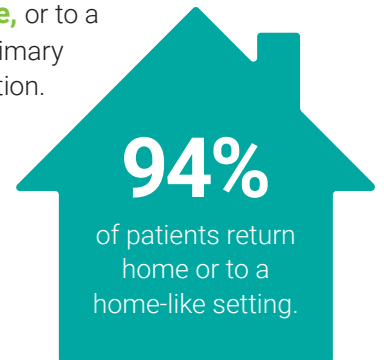
Progress Made

Sutter Rehabilitation Institute amputation patients made greater gains in self-care and mobility compared to patients at other rehabilitation facilities in California and the country.²



Returning to the Community

The ability to **return home**, or to a home-like setting, is the primary goal of inpatient rehabilitation. A high rate of return to the community means that most people progress enough to return home and that families and caregivers are trained to provide any needed care.¹



National benchmark is 78%.

Readmission to an Acute Hospital

Sometimes a change in a person's medical condition requires an admission to an acute hospital for further medical care. In 2023, **6%** of patients from Sutter Rehabilitation Institute were readmitted to an acute hospital due to a change in medical condition, which is lower than the California and national benchmark of **12%** and **11%**.¹
